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To our Lilburn Citizens:




Officer Michael T. Hester Honored

On April 19, 2024, Lilburn Police Department recognized Officer Michael T. Hester. We were honored to have his family, friends, and former coworkers in attendance. Officer Hester was the first African American Officer with Lilburn Police Department, hired in June of 1993. This officer was a Winder native, a Marine Corps reservist, and former Barrow County Deputy. Nearly a year later, he was killed in the line of duty while protecting the citizens of Lilburn. Officer Hester helped apprehend a robbery suspect when he was shot and killed. He was 26 years old. For his public service, the Lilburn Police Department renamed its lobby in his honor.




SUPPORT SERVICES UNIT

The Support Services Unit is comprised of two Police Support Specialists and a Support Services Manager. They submit statistics monthly to the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS), Hate Crime Statistics Data Collection Program, Law Enforcement Officers Killed & Assaulted (LEOKA), National Use of Force Data Collection, and the Law Enforcement Suicide Data Collection. In addition to case reporting, the unit processed over 800 background checks for public and private use, billed 734 false alarm calls, maintained over 800 criminal arrest warrants in the Georgia Crime Information System database, and processed over 1,300 open records requests. In 2024, the Support Services Unit processed 2,156 incident reports and 1,178 accident reports. Also in 2024, 6,811 citations and warnings were issued and processed.


This department is a member of the Georgia Records Association, a member of the Georgia Association of Terminal Agency Coordinators, and is responsible for maintaining compliance with the Georgia Crime Information Center (GCIC). This department is the official Records Custodian for the department and maintains all police department records with the exception of personnel records. We ensure adherence to established records retention schedules and the unit maintains policies and procedures for the department.

The City of Lilburn crime statistics show a 32.25% decrease in Part I Crimes over the past decade. Part I crimes include Homicide, Rape, Aggravated Assault, Robbery, Burglary, Larceny, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson.



Lilburn Police Department has been a participant in the FBI UCR Program (Uniform Crime Reporting) and now NIBRS (National Incident Based Reporting System). NIBRS was implemented to improve the overall quality of crime data collected by law enforcement. NIBRS goes more in depth because of its ability to provide circumstances and context for crimes like location, time of day, and whether the incident was cleared.

TRAINING UNIT

In 2024, the Lilburn Police Department officers completed a total of 5,757 hours of training. This far exceeds the minimum number of hours as mandated by the Peace Officer Standards Training Council. The training unit facilitated 31 in-service training classes, and two new Peace Officers successfully finished the Field Training Program. The department transitioned from the older Glock 17 MOS duty pistols to the newer Glock 47 MOS duty pistols, equipped with the latest Trijicon RCR optics. The Lilburn Police Department was among the first agencies in Georgia to implement this new pistol-mounted optic. Each officer was provided with a two full-day pistol transition course where they shot approximately 1000 rounds each to gain proficiency.

To enhance training, the unit has increased the use of reality and scenario-based training, providing officers with hands-on, realistic experiences. In collaboration with the Gwinnett County Transit system, the training unit utilized a bus for specialized training. Officers learned how to respond to calls for service on a bus, including techniques for disabling a bus in the event of a hijacking. Additionally, officers are required to demonstrate verbal de-escalation skills and proficiency in using the Taser in high-pressure situations. All patrol officers are equipped with tire deflation devices to help prevent or conclude vehicle pursuits. A new, modified Firearms Training Program now incorporates more tactical training and shooting exercises to better prepare officers for armed confrontations.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS UNIT

The Criminal Investigations Unit is comprised of a Lieutenant, 3 investigators, and an additional investigator assigned to the Gwinnett County Metro Drug Task Force. Criminal Investigations is responsible for investigating crimes committed within the city limits of Lilburn, but also works with other local, state, and federal agencies as needed. In 2024, the Criminal Investigations Unit worked 135 cases, issued 29 warrants, and cleared 58 cases. CID obtained a clearance rate of 42.96%.

PROPERTY AND EVIDENCE

SPO Chad Hannula supervises the Property and Evidence Unit for Lilburn Police Department. In 2024, the Property and Evidence Unit processed 812 new items into the Property and Evidence Room. This department currently maintains 8,514 items. There was a net increase of 399 active items in inventory in 2024.

The process for obtaining court orders to reduce the amount of property and evidence that is past disposition date was addressed. With the help of the City Attorney's Office, two court orders were completed in 2024. This was an exhaustive process which resulted in the court approving over 600 items be returned to owners, auctioned, or otherwise removed from the Property and Evidence Room. The Property and Evidence Unit is still in the process of purging these items pursuant to the court orders.

Propertyroom.com picked up 15 items, **\$247.54** was received from the sales.

Three vehicles were awarded to the city. One was by court order and is still on site at the evidence vehicle storage lot. The other two vehicles were awarded through the seizure process. One is still on site and must be held until a disposition of the criminal proceedings is received from the court system. The other was sold back to the owner per court order for **\$3000**. Also awarded by seizure was **\$11,907.00** in cash.

Two new cabinets were purchased for temporary holding bins and drying cabinets. They have been installed and are in use. These cabinets currently hold items awaiting court orders and critical evidence that needed drying in the recent double homicide. These cabinets were needed to safely secure items in accordance with International Association of Property and Evidence standards.

Added in 2024 = 812 items

End of 2024 = 8039

The goal of 2025 will be a reduction of active items past disposition date. In 2024 over 150 items were re-activated after return from the GBI and over 100 items more were turned in by officers than in 2023 which added to the active numbers increasing.



SPECIAL RESPONSE TEAM

The Special Response Team is comprised of members from Municipal cities in Gwinnett County. These sworn Peace Officers are trained and equipped to meet the unique challenges of high risk operations.





In 2024 the Multi-Jurisdictional Special Response Team served 10 Search Warrants, which also included cases for the Gwinnett Metro Task Force. These high risk search warrants ranged from narcotics charges to sexual exploitation of children.



PATROL

The Patrol Division is led by the Patrol Lieutenant under the Operations Division. During 2024, the Operations Division maintained high visibility and conducted numerous area, residential, and business checks.

The Patrol Unit answered a total of 23,350 calls for services. Units have generated 2,156 incident reports, of which 48% cleared by arrest.

Patrol Units have assisted in Community Outreach Events, Hiring Events, and Multi-Cultural Events with our Community Outreach Officer. Patrol Units use time while patrolling neighborhoods to meet the citizens of our community and help educate them on how not to become victims of crimes. Officers speak with citizen on locking car doors and not leaving valuables in vehicles.



LILBURN K-9 UNIT



- Lilburn Police Department K-9 Unit was established in January of 2017. Since the unit has been active, it has been responsible for numerous apprehensions from burglaries in progress, to tracking, to narcotics, to located articles. In addition to daily proactive measures to combat crimes, the unit also participates in community events and conducts demonstrations for the public at scheduled events. Also, the unit competes and certifies yearly through NNDDA and AWD.
- In 2024, the K-9 unit (SPO Ajanovic and K-9 Ajax) was responsible for 45 arrests, ranging from narcotics (meth, cocaine, marijuana) to tracking to article finds.



- In April 2024, K-9 Ajax and SPO Ajanovic certified through two separate organizations (NNDDA and AWD) in patrol and narcotics. During the certification, the K-9 team also competed in various scenarios and deployments and was awarded 1st place in patrol.
- In 2024, K-9 Unit completed over 220 hours of training and had 37 deployed calls.
- K9 Ajax and Handler Aj Ajanovic had their 100th apprehension in 2024.

LILBURN K-9 UNIT

- Lilburn PD's K-9 Unit started working interdiction to combat drug activities taking place. K-9 unit was able to observe what appeared to be a hand-to-hand transaction. K-9 unit was able to conduct a traffic stop on the vehicle that subject entered, which later resulted in the subject getting arrested for an outstanding warrant and also possession of cocaine.
- The K-9 Unit continued working interdiction in known drug areas. During patrol, K-9 Unit observed a vehicle next to a dumpster. An encounter was made with the subjects around the vehicle. During contact with the subject, an item was discarded by the suspect, which was spotted by K-9 unit and recovered, which ended up being 250 individual baggies of cocaine (5 ounces). Subject arrested.
- Our K-9 Unit responded to a burglary at a residence in Lilburn. K-9 Ajax conducted a track and K-9 Ajax went the opposite direction of where the victim claimed the suspect went and actively tracked the suspect, to the point where he pushed the suspect out of the woods to a perimeter unit, leading to a successful arrest of the burglary suspect.



- SRT Team responded to a search warrant. After SRT conducted the search warrant. K-9 Ajax was deployed into the woods for an article search behind the complex, who found the suspect's rifle in the woods in a bookbag. Suspect arrested.
- K-9 Unit conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle for a traffic violation. During the traffic stop, the subject was arrested for an outstanding warrant. The subject had possession of marijuana more than an ounce and cocaine with him.

Due to the proactive measures and tasks that the unit successfully accomplished, the K-9 Unit was expanded and in July of 2024, another K-9 was purchased. Handler Ofc. Kyle Fields and K-9 Dezik started their duties on December 2nd, 2024.

TRAFFIC UNIT



In 2024, the Lilburn Traffic Unit issued 2,883 traffic citations. There were 1,178 traffic accidents reported, and four of those were serious injury/fatality accidents.

The officers assigned to this position have hundreds of hours of specialized training. Part of that development includes accident investigation and reconstruction, Standardized Field Sobriety Testing, Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement, Auto Theft investigation, and a multitude of ongoing training. Our department is proud to have two phlebotomists on staff.

The Traffic Unit attends monthly meetings as part of the Metro Atlanta Traffic Enforcement Network. These meetings are held at different agencies where various topics are discussed. After most of these meetings, a road check is conducted where multiple officers from various agencies participate and they look for safety violations, ensuring drivers are operating a vehicle with a valid license, ensuring vehicles have updated registration and insurance. The City of Lilburn also conducts at least two safety checks per year, and we are assisted by different agencies including Georgia State Patrol.

TRAFFIC UNIT

“Enforcing traffic laws is an integral part of being a police officer. The City of Lilburn has two officers assigned as Traffic Units and we concentrate on enforcing those laws. The various violations we look for are speeding, drivers using their phones, drivers not wearing seat belts, unrestrained kids, driving through red lights and not stopping at stop signs - to name a few. We encounter these daily and every one of these violations is dangerous in its own way, so we do what we can to not only keep the citizens of Lilburn safe, but also anyone driving through our city. The safety of everyone traveling through the City of Lilburn is very important to us which is why a Traffic Unit is necessary. “

Code Enforcement

In 2024, two Code Enforcement Officers resigned from the Lilburn Police Department, which left the entire workload on one officer. Officer Dillard did not falter but took on the job with his head held high. Lilburn Code Enforcement this year filled the vacant positions by adding two full-time officers; Officer Ray Charles and Officer Kiersten McCord. With the addition of those two staff members, we saw an increase in cases for the 2024 year as our officers “hit the ground running”.

In 2024, Code Enforcement worked 3,309 proactive cases with 3,171 cases closed with compliance. Reactive cases received by complaint via Request Tracker where 1,346 cases in which 1,056 cases have been resolved. Over 4,655 cases were worked this year with an 89% clearance rate. Through hard work and a drive to make Lilburn a safer and more beautified city, Code Enforcement has led the charge to accomplish the goals set forth, both for the city and the community alike.

- ◆ Lilburn Code Enforcement worked tirelessly in May of 2024 to do a sweep of expired business licenses.
- ◆ Among many other projects, Code Enforcement went through a proactive investigation of unlicensed short-term rental properties.
- ◆ 69 citations issued for violations.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH



This year Corporal Mike Johnson celebrated 26 years with Lilburn Police Department! He has been an integral part of our agency for years and we look forward to many more!

The Lilburn Police Department had a banner year in 2024. The Lilburn Police Department held 73 safety meetings and presentations. These meetings were held in various locations throughout the City of Lilburn to include schools, houses of faith, businesses, and residential communities.

During 2024, Community Outreach also added a second officer, SPO Veronica Arnold. She started with patrol, made this move, and has been able to increase the capability of the program and reach more citizens. This year Community Outreach also:

- Presented three senior scam presentations to help prevent our elderly citizens from being victimized by scammers.
- Held three cookouts for neighborhood watch groups.
- Sponsored two Red Cross Blood Drives; to include one being in partnership with the National Faith and Blue event in order to improve relationships with houses of faith and the police who serve their communities.
- Participated in two DEA Takeback events and collected a total of 235 pounds of unused or expired medication from the Lilburn community to help prevent those medications from being abused or used.
- The Lilburn Police Department held classes for three church groups in relation to active shooter preparedness, Stop the Bleed, and Church Safety protocol.
- The Lilburn Police Department went to visit Camp Rise, a special needs summer camp at The Nett Church. Lilburn Officers had a chance to meet the campers and show them police cars and talk to them about safety. This was a great time by all!

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

The Lilburn Police Department met with management and business owners at the Indian Trail Shopping Center to start a business watch in relation to an ongoing crime trend of recent burglaries. We were able to provide information on updates on suspects, how to report suspicious activity, and light improvements. Information was also relayed on how to obtain a Flock camera for the shopping center. A decommissioned police vehicle was also used in the parking lot as a deterrent. Throughout the rest of 2024, there were no more burglaries in the area.

- The Lilburn Police Department also met with a local Boy Scout group for their summer camp at Parkview Christian Church.
- The Lilburn Police Department held our annual National Night Out event at the Lilburn City Park where dozens of police agencies joined us for a night of fun and music meeting their local police officers and seeing a helicopter fly into the park.
- The Lilburn Police Department assisted several individuals who were homeless in need of coats, clothing and assistance. The Lilburn Police Department worked with several churches in the area to stock community pantries and worked with an outreach group to have brand new coats to give out to those in need. The Lilburn Police Department also continued to work on the best practices and solutions to homelessness and know resources and how to use them.
- Community outreach SPO Arnold has attended several Spanish podcasts to educate the Hispanic community about the law and many more subjects.
- Corporal Johnson was recognized by the Lilburn Woman's Club as Outstanding Citizen of The Year for efforts in the city with the Lilburn Police Department.

During the months of August and September, the Operations Division held the Women's Self-Defense classes. The Women's Self-Defense Program is a two-day, comprehensive course that begins with classroom instruction in risk awareness, risk reduction, crime prevention strategies, and defensive concepts followed by hands-on training in physical defense techniques. Class instruction and demonstrations will allow you to decrease your vulnerability and give you a new sense of confidence and personal power. Class activities and discussions are designed to help women identify their risks, evaluate their strengths, and explore their options for dealing with the threat of violence.

The Lilburn Municipal Court office is comprised of a Court Administrator, a Deputy Court Administrator, and two Court Clerks. Judge Charles Barrett, III is the Chief Court Official. Robert Giannini is the Chief Court Solicitor. In 2024, City of Lilburn welcomed Joseph Randazzo and Richard Armond as solicitors. Lilburn Municipal Court also partnered with a new probation company, Professional Probation Services.

In 2024, the Lilburn Municipal Court operated a total of 98 court sessions. This includes 86 regular court sessions, 4 Red Speed court sessions, 4 bench trial court sessions, and 4 Teen Court sessions. In 2024, Lilburn Municipal Court processed 6,697 cases.

All court staff are bilingual in Spanish and able to provide that valuable service to members of our community.
